Completing the Cornerstone Curriculum Transition Checksheet

Process:

1. Fill out each area with the old three-hour courses that the student will have completed before fall semester, 2010.
2. Note how many hours will have been earned by fall semester 2010.
3. Note how many hours will be needed after fall semester 2010. Use the course equivalency guide for the old Cornerstone Curriculum to determine which new courses meet the old requirements.
4. Compare to the number of hours needed to complete the Cornerstone Curriculum to those needed to complete the new general education requirements.

NOTE ON DOUBLE COUNTING:

In general, students may double-count between the Cornerstone Curriculum and the major or minor (where applicable). In general, students may **not** double-count between the Cornerstone Curriculum and the B.A. or B.S. requirements except in the case of interdisciplinary and/or cultural studies. In that case, students may take interdisciplinary/cultural courses in the B.A. or B.S. requirements (e.g., social science, literature, humanities) and have them count in both the Cornerstone Curriculum and the B.A. or B.S. requirements.
