Q&A WITH THE PRINCETON REVIEW'S

Over his 28-year career, he has been a college admissions administrator, publisher, editor, author, and lecturer. Q. What sort of prestige is associated with appearing in the **Princeton Review Best Colleges guide?**

A. First, I must say what fans we are at The Princeton Review of Florida Southern College. It offers outstanding academics, has truly dedicated administrative leaders, faculty and staff and a student body that is contagious with energy. I speak with firsthand knowledge as I have personally visited Florida Southern many times as part of our research for our book and our surveys for this project. As to the prestige of being a school we profile in our "Best Colleges" guide — I can answer that with simple math: only about 15% of the four-year colleges in America are in the guide. NURSING CRISIS CONTINUES

A combination of converging threats have pushed the U.S. Department of Labor and the American Association of Colleges of Nursing (AACN) to sound the alarm for increased enrollment and training of nursing professionals at the baccalaureate and graduate levels.

The Department of Labor predicts that at least 437,000 new jobs will be added in the field by 2026.

State-by-state analysis shows that the nursing shortage will be most intense in the American South and West. In Florida alone, the demand for registered nurses is projected to increase by 76,600 or 31%.



students who make up the School of Nursing and Health Sciences in order to meet this overwhelming need for talented, effective nursing professionals," said Ann Blanton Edwards, a trustee of Florida Southern College and retired nurse. "This expansion and naming of the School of Nursing and Health Sciences will benefit our local, state, and national communities by providing our nursing students with a comprehensive education in the liberal arts and sciences as they examine the latest nursing practices and gain the clinical experience needed to become expert caregivers."

To further support the training of our graduate students, FSC recently acquired St. Joseph's Academy. The new

property will house the MSN and DNP degree programs, helping meet the demand for training spaces for our rapidly growing undergraduate nursing program.

EQUIPPING FUTURE HEALTHCARE LEADERS

COMER NAMED TO DR. KEITH R. BEREND **ENDOWED CHAIR IN NURSING**

Dean Linda Comer is an extraordinary leader who emphasizes shaping the next generation of nurses to help their patients to heal, grow, and contribute. Her vision for modern nursing education at

Florida Southern College is grounded in her more than 35 years of experience as an administrator, educator, critical care nurse, and mental health counselor.

"I believe that as a nurse educator, I can change the world just a little by empowering students with nursing knowledge and a desire for lifelong learning," Dean Comer reflected.

Dean Comer received her Bachelor of Science in Nursing from North Carolina Agricultural and Technical State University. She went on to complete a Master of Science in Nursing with a focus on Nursing Education, a Master of Science in Community Counseling, and a Doctor of Philosophy in Curricular Foundations of Education from The University of North Carolina at Greensboro. Dean Comer's education and career in the field of nursing grows out of a lifelong passion for the study of medicine, patient care and advocacy, and the vocation of teaching.

"I hope that my impact will be positive in both local and national arenas," said Dean Comer. "At Florida Southern, my goal is for our school to increase the number of exceptional nurses and nurse practitioners to meet the healthcare needs of the local area and beyond. Polk County is designated as a medically-underserved area, with a shortage of both nurses and primary care providers. I am committed to the social mission of nursing, which reflects the values of Florida Southern in terms of desire to make a substantial impact on society. An educator is always most proud of the accomplishments of their students, and that will be my legacy."

FIRST DOCTOR OF NURSING PRACTICE **GRADUATING CLASS**

On August 24th, FSC recognized the granting of doctoral degrees to the school's first cohort of DNP students in a hooding ceremony. The students, Doris Thornhill, Sara Bashyam, Tracie Barber, Carol Anderson, Dianna Moorer, Kristen Milinazzo, and Elizabeth Palazzi-Xirinaches, presented their capstone scholarly project posters in the Joe K. and Alberta Blanton Nursing Building on August 11, 2021.

As part of the College's engaged learning curriculum, DNP students are required to select a real-world health issue, examine current literature, and implement evidence-based interventions to improve population health and healthcare delivery. Under the guidance of Dr. Melanie Michael, associate professor and director of the graduate nursing program, and Dr. Tracy Magee, assistant professor of pediatric nursing, the final DNP scholarly projects represent the culmination of the six-semester program.

"Our Doctor of Nursing Practice degree prepares a nurse to practice at the highest level of the profession, bringing skills in leadership, quality enhancement, and innovation to bear on the challenging issues evident in the current healthcare environment," said Dean Comer. "Our first graduating class developed projects that positively impacted heart failure patient outcomes, infant safe sleep and potential infant mortality, telehealth service implementation, and care of chest pain patients."

MEET THE DEAN!

DR. SARA FLETCHER HARDING APPOINTED AS NEW DEAN OF THE SCHOOL OF ARTS & SCIENCES

his fall, Florida Southern College appointed Dr. Sara Fletcher Harding as the new Dean of the School of Arts & Sciences, the College's largest school. Dean Harding served as interim dean for the 2019-2020 and 2020-2021 academic years, and she holds faculty rank as a tenured Professor of Religion.

"It is an honor and a joy to be appointed as Dean of the School of Arts & Sciences and to serve its students and faculty in this capacity," said Dr. Harding. "As an administrator with deep roots at FSC, I have an unwavering commitment to faculty excellence, engaged learning, and interdisciplinary student experiences that facilitate possibility and growth."

Dr. Harding joined the faculty of FSC in 1997. She earned her B.A. in Psychology from Nebraska Wesleyan University, her M.A. in Religion from Iliff School of Theology, and her Ph.D. in Religious Studies with a concentration in New Testament from Marquette University. Dr. Harding has received numerous accolades that highlight her engaging pedagogu and classroom presence, including the Omicron Delta Kappa Teacher of the Year Award (2010), the General Board of Higher Education and Ministry of the UMC Exemplary Teaching Award (2010), the Miller Distinguished Faculty Award for Excellence in Teaching (2015), and the Ben and Janice Wade Outstanding Teaching Award (2019).

Dr. Harding is an interdisciplinary scholar who promotes dialogue between the humanities and the sciences. She has worked as a co-editor of *Religion and Science: Critical* Concepts in Religious Studies, which resulted from her collaborations with Dr. Nancy M. Morvillo, chair of FSC's biology department. In 2011, on behalf of the College and her colleagues, Dr. Harding received a competitive International





Society for Science and Religion Library Award. In 2012, she participated in the Jessie Ball duPont Seminar, which was sponsored by the National Humanities Center to encourage interdisciplinary connections in college-level teaching.

Professor Tim Register, assistant professor of film at FSC, hones his practice outside of the classroom with creative projects shaped to impact our community and world. Professor Register's most recent project, "Preach," is set to air soon across North America.

"Preach" follows the ministry of a war-torn United Methodist minister, Carl 'Preach' MacNicol, who is gifted a chance to redeem himself as he seeks to control his inner demons. The series is inspired by the life story of Professor Register's grandfather, a gambler turned revival preacher who established a congregation in Florida during the period of the Great Depression.

"Preach" unfolds as a redemption story exploring whether or not Reverend MacNicol will be able to guide his parish to love one another or instead fall prey to his anger and haunted past. Set in the fictional town of "Nineveh" in South Georgia following World War I, Reverend MacNicol embarks to lead his small congregation to practice selfless love within their community. Professor Register hopes that the series will call its audience to the same loving acceptance of their neighbors in today's world.

Professor Register and the rest of FSC's film faculty actively draws students and alumni into their work to teach and provide internship and early career support to Florida Southern students and graduates. "Preach" represents one such project, a collaborative joint venture among FSC faculty, students, alumni, and local business partners to launch an artistic vision while simultaneously training screenwriters, directors, producers, film crew, and creators.

Florida Southern faculty bring relevant industry experience into the classroom and training process, functioning as both knowledgeable professors and real-world mentors for FSC students. Professor Register guides his students in honing their script writing, broadcasting, and directing skills even as he walks them through the everyday life of the film industry, such as navigating the process of getting in the door and moving up the ranks.

Professor Register teaches his students that skill alone is not enough to move forward, and he draws students to focus on becoming a part of the film team with a collaborative spirit.

"I teach my students, day one: be helpful, be collaborative, show up early and help other departments clean up at the end of the day," said Professor Register. "Be there for your team, be pleasant, and bring the donuts every once and a while — that's day one. The individual with the best equipment who isn't a team player gets bumped down the call list compared to the individual who shows up ready to do their job and support the whole team."

With influential contacts across the film industry, Professor Register helps place students as interns at production companies like NFocus, Nickelodeon, National Geographic, and Disney. Yet, he repeatedly tells his students that once they are in the door, the path to getting a call back and hired for different projects lies in teamwork, collaboration, and sincerity.

Modeling the spirit of teamwork, "Preach" has truly functioned as a collaborative FSC project. The film series involved FSC film students, recent graduates, and a wide range of alumni with Professor Register at the helm. For current students and recent graduates, the film project provided practical, engaged learning and real world experience in script writing and re-writing, acting, filming techniques, production and post-production editing, and more.

REAL WORLD EXPERIENCE, RESUME BUILDING

Taylor Tyre '19, a recent FSC graduate, served as Assistant to the Director of the series by pitching her ideas and helping Professor Register to work with the script day in and day out. Chandler Fletcher '23, a current FSC student, took on a key role across the first half of the series by acting as the warden of Reverend MacNicol's prison. Alumni such as Jesse Larson '09, president of NFocus, Dean McGregor '19, and Ashley Barnett '13 took on various acting and

production roles on the set. Barney '65 and Carol Jenkins '79 Barnett invested in the project to make it possible, and Wesley and Nicholas Barnett '18 both served as part of the production team for the series.

so that numerous students engage with "Preach" in hands-on classroom learning experiences. For example, students in Professor Register's screenwriting class drew from the scripts and film reels of "Preach" to discuss a scene that Professor Register and the crew had to rewrite on the spot because of uncooperative weather when they shot it.

Professor Register uses the example and others like it to reinforce with his students that the screenwriting process is an ongoing, living work: "I tell them that you are never finished writing until it makes air. You're not finished writing because something will happen on the set, or an actor or production assistant or member of the art department will have a better idea so that, if you're willing to be open to it, you are never finished writing."

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
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Next semester, students in Professor Register's directing class will interact with original scripts, pictures from the shooting location, and raw, uncut footage so that they can practice blocking and pitching their own perspectives in class.

A major cable network has recently purchased the series, richly returning the investment of supporters like Steve Maxwell and the Barnetts. The Preach series will touch the hearts of a vast North American audience with its message of personal transformation and love for one's neighbor. Professor Register intends to continue using the series and other film projects to build relationships with students as well as provide experiential classroom teaching moments, internship opportunities, and early career experiences for FSC film graduates: "You know, God willing, season two of 'Preach' and beyond happens, so that I am able to incorporate my students on future projects and help them hone their career skills."

As a Trustee and Distinguished Alumnus of Florida Southern, Berend has also recently established the Dr. Keith R. Berend Endowed Chair in Nursing for the Ann Blanton Edwards School of Nursing and Health Sciences.

Berend also sponsors The Berend Fellows, which gives as many as three Florida Southern College students each year an internship opportunity at Berend's practice in Ohio.

Now, Berend has his name forever linked to Florida Southern College athletics.

Berend remembers when he played flag football on the field that came to bear his name when he was a freshman at Florida Southern College in 1989.

He referred to his class as a "lost generation" because he remembered that there wasn't a ton of pride in the school, and there were no real examples of giving back.

It took conversations with Dr. Rob Tate, the now retired Vice President for Advancement at Florida Southern, to entice Berend to start giving back.

"It all changed for me when I got reacquainted with Dr. Rob Tate," Berend said. "I had never met with Dr. Kerr, and we had started talking about opportunities to give back."

Berend said it started slowly, first with an academic scholarship to the men's swimming team in 2012, which is one of only two endowed scholarships that have been gifted to swimming athletes, matching one given by Hal and Marjorie Roberts for both the men's and women's teams.

From there Berend started to broaden his influence.

"Dr. Berend's name is synonymous with excellence, not only in the world of medicine, but also here at Florida Southern College," Florida Southern College President Dr. Anne B. Kerr said. "To have his name attached to ongoing academic and athletic endeavors only heightens Florida Southern College's profile. We are excited and extremely honored to dedicate Berend Field upon which future generations can pursue championships."

Since 2012, Berend's hands have helped 18 Berend Fellows thus far.

In 2014, Berend's generosity was felt with a substantial gift to the Biology labs that enabled the College to add three new labs on the main floor of the Berry Citrus Building in Microbiology, Molecular Biology, and Tissue Culture.

Berend has also had success on campus with a project in collaboration with Dr. Shameka Shelby, an associate professor of chemistry at Florida Southern.

Berend and Shelby are working together with students who are performing research into post-operative infection and bleeding.

"Dr. Shelby has filed patents on some of the technology and it looks pretty interesting," Berend said. "It's about helping the College and students have an impact on the quality of life. It's been fun to develop a product that might change people's lives."

Berend has certainly already done that with his countless hip and knee surgeries, giving mobility and livelihood back to his patients.

GENEROUS PHILANTHROPY

Dr. Berend's donations to Florida Southern have similarly imbued the College with life, and we are honored to have his name forever associated with the campus' sports legacy.

"I have no doubt that Berend Field will be a place where student-athletes will excel," Dr. Kerr said. "Friendships will be made that will last a lifetime, championships will be won, pride will flourish over Florida Southern's winning traditions, and a generation of Mocs will celebrate the excellence of Florida Southern carrying forward the legacy of excellence of Keith Berend and his family."

A TRADITION OF EXCELLENCE

FLORIDA SOUTHERN BASEBALL'S 1971 AND 1972 NATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIPS

tradition of excellence can always point back to a specific time or date when it all began. For Florida Southern College, the drive to 30 NCAA National Championships began in 1971 and 1972, as the Mocs baseball team captured the first two titles in school history. The Mocs also became the first program to repeat as Division II National Champions, posting a combined 65-10 record in those two seasons for head coach Hal Smeltzly.

"The Old Grey Fox" had assembled one of the premier programs, not just in the state of Florida, but the entire

country. While the 1971 team broke through to win the championship, the program had been one of the best in the nation for some time. Smeltzly had amassed such talent at FSC, and the pieces fit together magically in 1971.

"We were second in the region (in 1970), and that just fueled us," said Reggie Ardis, who joined the program for the 1971 season. "We were so close, that we were right there on the doorstep and we didn't push over. So when we came back, we knew what our goal was. Once we achieved that goal, it was easy to get the second one."



THE 1971 SEASON

The 1971 team produced 34 wins against only four losses all season, including a 14-game winning streak. The Mocs topped several perennial powers along the way, including Florida, Miami, Vanderbilt, North Carolina, and Stetson. After a successful regular season, the Mocs swept through the regionals, held in Norfolk, Va., before a plane trip to

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Springfield, Mo., brought the Mocs to the national tournament. After an opening game loss to San Diego, the Mocs won four consecutive games to earn the first national championship in school history.

The team featured a cast of characters for the ages, including several FSC Hall of Famers. Greg Pryor earned All-America status, and was Co-MVP of the national tournament, with a combined 10 hits. Pryor would go on to a lengthy career in Major League Baseball, including winning a World Series with the Kansas City Royals in 1985. Kevin Bryant, also Co-MVP in 1971, was instrumental in

Florida Southern staying alive during the tournament, with a five RBI performance against Central Michigan in the penultimate game. Bryant led the team by hitting .380, with a team-high 54 hits during the season. Jay Smith threw a complete-game six-hit shutout in the title game, after pitching a complete-game four-hit shutout earlier in the tournament. On the season, Smith went 15-1, with 149 strikeouts, the third most in a single season in school history, and a 1.56 ERA. Tom Exum went 6-0 on the mound, while John Carroll was the team's Most Valuable Player. Also making the All-Tournament team at the championships were Artie Gonzalez and Atlas Jones.

THE 1972 SEASON

A year later, the Mocs repeated as national champions, with a 31-6 overall record. Florida Southern won its first seven games, and 21 of its first 23. Again, the Mocs beat the best colleges and universities across the country, including a two-game sweep of Miami to end the regular season. After a short break in the schedule, another trip





to Norfolk led to another Mocs sweep in the Regionals, sending Southern to the nationals, this time in Springfield, Ill.

After defeating Missouri-Saint Louis in the first game, the Mocs faced Cal State-Northridge in a best-of-three scenario. The teams split the first two games, setting up a winnertake-all final. For the second consecutive year, Jay Smith was the winning pitcher in the title game, tossing a complete game, scattering four hits with 13 strikeouts. It was his second complete game win of the tournament, which earned him Most Outstanding Player honors for the national tournament.

"THE OLD GREY FOX"

The glue that held the program together was Smeltzly. The veteran coach and administrator understood people, and knew how to get the most out of his student-athletes. "(Smeltzly) was instrumental in giving us confidence," Ardis said. "We weren't the best athletes, but we had more fire in our bellies to get the job done. Everybody was pulling for one another. Coach made sure of that."

In his 18 years at the helm of the Mocs, Smeltzly won 391 games, more than 70% of his games coached. He has been inducted into several Halls of Fame, including the American Baseball Coaches Association, Florida Sports, Polk County Sports, and FSC Athletic Department.

SUPER BOWL LV CHAMP

Former Florida Southern College baseball student-athlete Bobby Slater, class of 1994, became a Super Bowl champion on February 7 as the Tampa Bay Buccaneers defeated the Kansas City Chiefs, 31-9, in Super Bowl LV.

Slater currently serves as the head athletic trainer for the Tampa Bay Buccaneers. The 2020 season marked his seventh with the Bucs organization. Prior to Tampa Bay, he spent 14 years on the Chicago Bears staff.

While at Florida Southern, Slater played two seasons with the baseball program and was a senior on the Moccasins 1994 NCAA National Runner-Up team. Playing in 72 career games, he batted .332 with 61 runs scored and 22 stolen bases. His consistent performances saw him score 31 runs as a junior and 30 as a senior; post a .505 slugging percentage in 1993 and a .500 mark in 1994; record a .457 on-base percentage his first season (led team) and a .450 stat as a senior; and swipe 10 bases as a junior and 12 as a senior.

BETH ANN BALDRY NICHOLS '02 MAKING HISTORY

While a student-athlete on the women's golf team at Florida Southern College, Beth Ann Baldry Nichols '02 also was doing some English tutoring on the side. She signed up for a sports writing class at the suggestion of her advisor, thinking that she might be able to tutor a few of the athletes who would be her classmates.

"I absolutely fell in love with it!" says Nichols. "It was the career I never knew I wanted."

A PASSION FOR GOLF AND JOURNALISM

As a way to combine her passions for golf and journalism, Nichols applied for a job with Golfweek magazine and was hired to work Friday and Saturday nights during the spring semester of her senior year. She has risen through the ranks at the Orlando-based company ever since, becoming managing editor of Golfweek.com in 2004 and moving into her current position as senior writer in 2006.

Her success at Golfweek has led to a new and exciting career development: Nichols now is president of the Golf Writers Association of America (GWAA). She is the first woman to be named to that position in the organization's 75-year history.

"More than six million women played golf in the U.S. last year, about half a million more than the previous year," said Nichols, citing figures from the National Golf Foundation.

"Golf has enjoyed an incredible boom during the pandemic. Families took up the sport — seen as one of the few things you could do together outdoors — and girls' golf is the fastest-growing segment of the golf community. That's the most exciting thing for me."

For her part, Nichols credits former FSC instructor Bob Black '51, whose sports writing course sparked her interest in the field, shaping the direction of her career and life.

"One thousand percent, I would not have this job without Mr. Black and his class," Nichols says. "I remember so much of what he taught. His encouragement meant the world to me; he laid the foundation and gave me the confidence to pursue this career."

In addition to introducing Nichols to the basics of sports journalism, Black suggested that she write for FSC's student newspaper, *The Southern*. She covered athletics and later became the paper's editor.

A native of Lakeland, who attended George Jenkins High School, Nichols has returned to FSC on several occasions to speak with writing and reporting classes, including Black's sports writing class when he was still teaching.

Upon learning of Nichols' appointment as GWAA president, Black sent her a congratulatory note and reflected on the talent he had seen in her as a newcomer to his sports writing class. "Beth Ann was writing professionally in college," Black recalls. "This is a notable win for women journalists."

REMEMBERING DR. CHRISTOVERSON

r. Marcene Heisner Christoverson passed away on March 27 2021

Dr. Christoverson was born in Nebraska City, Neb., in 1922 and graduated from Boise (Idaho) High School in 1941.

Dr. Christoverson's sense of duty was at the forefront early, as she served as a Wave in the United States Navy from July 15, 1943 until March 1, 1946.

In 1947, she started work as an accounting assistant with The St. John Letter Company in New York City, where she quickly rose through the ranks. She was elected the company's President and CEO in 1980 before later becoming the sole owner in 1988.

Thanks to her vision and generosity, in 2010 Florida Southern College dedicated the Marcene H. and Robert E. Christoverson Humanities Building. The College is also home to the Robert E. Christoverson Memorial Garden, given in memory of Dr. Christoverson's late husband, which graces the walkway alongside the Joseph-Reynolds and Allen Spivey residential halls.

Dr. Christoverson believed that the nation's future was dependent on the effectiveness of higher education and graduates who are prepared for the future. She launched Florida Southern College's campaign with one of the first gifts to renovate the campus, and set the standard for an excellent living and learning environment for students as well as professors. Dr. Christoverson was proud that every FSC student would likely have a class in the Christoverson Building.

























FSC PLANETARIUM RESTORATION OUT OF THIS WORLD! AND BEYOND

With more than a combined \$500,000 in grants obtained from the Florida Division of Historical Resources and the National Park Service, as well as a generous contribution from local philanthropist Gregory Fancelli, Pepino can focus on the future of the FSC Planetarium.







PROJECT PLANETARIUM

It was to the future that Fancelli's donation was aimed.

Fancelli is a fan of Frank Lloyd Wright architecture, so preserving the FSC Planetarium was something that he felt he could get behind in a big way.

"I choose my projects on uniqueness, architecture relevance, and based on what use I feel I can give to a building," Fancelli said. "The FSC Planetarium meets all the aforementioned aspects that motivate me to undertake a project, on top of the fact that its readapted use can benefit the public and future generations. It will be a space that can be enjoyed and admired as a product of a very specific time, designed by one of the most renowned architects of all time."

The Polk County Science Building, which houses the FSC Planetarium, was completed in 1958 as the final building designed by Wright to be finished on campus. The first show in the FSC Planetarium was in 1960, but over the years, the Florida weather took its toll on the building, ultimately forcing it to be closed in 2014.

The money collected funded work on several aspects of the building to bring the FSC Planetarium back to its former state of glory. The restorative work done included replacing the roof and surrounding areas of the dome, replacing the roof of lower terraces, removing and replacing stucco in the upper portions of the building, restoring and renovating windows and doors, and replacing a number of cracked blocks around the outer shell of the building and around terraces on the west side.

A STAR IS REBORN

With the work completed on the outside, Dr. Pepino and future students look forward to using the inside again.

Dr. Pepino is planning on creating a public group called "Friends of Space" to help financially support the instructional space programs that Florida Southern will offer. This will include educational programming that will impact Polk County K-12 students.

MEET GREGORY FANCELLI

Gregory Fancelli, born in Florence, Italy, has divided his time between Lakeland and Tuscany.

He has attended the University of Florence where he received his bachelor's degree in business administration.

Fancelli has focused his

efforts on preserving the



architectural integrity and character of Lakeland for more than a decade. His vision for a new kind of community can be clearly seen in the newly preserved historic homes his company has renovated.

As the head of Worldwide Prestige Group, Fancelli has been involved in restoring 22 residential and seven commercial properties, as well as seven community art projects in Lakeland.

"Historic preservation is a way to keep alive craftsmanship of an earlier era build community and generate a sense of pride," Fancelli said. "In some cases, restoring buildings actually rebuilds the social fabric of the community."

In addition to the responsibilities associated with his ownership of Prestige Worldwide Group, Gregory continues to be involved in the Lakeland community by serving on the boards of several organizations, among them the George Jenkins Foundation, Academy Prep of Lakeland, and the Lakeland Regional Health Foundation. He is also a former board member of the Polk Museum and the Florida Polytechnic University Foundation.

Along with his passion for early 20th century architecture and restoring historic buildings, Gregory enjoys traveling, photography, skiing and water sports.

The College has recently received a separate federal grant for renovating the inside of the building, which is where Florida Southern alum Arjeet Tipirneni '21 spent a lot of time.

"When I started at FSC in the fall of 2016. I was always in awe of the fact



that we had a planetarium," said Tipirneni, who is now studying dentistry at the University of Florida. "As someone who loves astronomy and all things space, I was super excited to get involved with the FSC Planetarium somehow. Over the next few years, working with Dr. Pepino, I and my Astronomy Club team (Spencer Asperilla and John Gould) would set aside our personal time to go into the space and try to get something useful out of it."

"It wasn't until a year after we started going in there and messing around with the technology and consulting with other planetariums in the greater central Florida area (who said our machine belonged in a museum) that we were able to get it working enough to do one show: More Than Meets the Eyes. After doing some private viewings for friends to test it out, we knew it was ready for some primetime action and we started to host elementary school shows and movie nights for FSC students. We initially couldn't find the script for the one show that we could do so I used my knowledge of astronomy and space exploration to ad lib the show. It wasn't until after months of sorting through the treasure trove of projector slides, laser discs, and an old manual from

the 60's that I found the script. We were really a bunch of digital-aged kids having to teach ourselves the way of the analog world ... it was vintage!"

FOCUSED ON THE FUTURE

Since the FSC Planetarium's reopening, the FSC Astronomy Club has already made use of the space with a movie night, and there are plans for similar events.

Dr. Pepino is focused on the future, and that includes better equipment, which will not only entice student groups from outside of Florida Southern, but also tourists and other members of the community at large to experience the wonders of the FSC Planetarium.

"With an upgrade, the room would be amazing," Dr. Pepino said. "Some of the new equipment is phenomenal. It would be fantastic if we could find some funds or a donor or two to upgrade the equipment. For the astronomy classes, that would be a fantastic thing. The school could also use it on their tours. It would be a fantastic place to stop and get the star ball moving."

"It's a very rare building. It's a really interesting classroom experience where you can do these virtual journeys through space. It makes things much more exciting than just drawing on a whiteboard. You can zoom in and have these interesting virtual things. As a tool it would be amazing for the course, and it would be amazing for other events."

Larry A. Powell of Winter Haven, who worked as director of recreation and volunteerism from 1986 until 1998, died Feb. 19, 2021.




Nancy C. Warren, who worked as a cafeteria employee from 1997 until her retirement in 2019, died June 10, 2021.

JAMES L. BAKER, JR., M.D., F.A.C.S. '58 of Winter Park died on January 11, 2021. A noted plastic surgeon and medical pioneer, he began his medical career in 1964 at Monmouth Medical Center in Long Branch, N.J., before moving his family to Orlando in 1969. He went on to establish his own practice, where he developed an international reputation for excellence in the field of aesthetic plastic surgery, specializing in breast augmentation, facial rejuvenation, and body contouring procedures.

In 1974, he co-authored his first study, and in 1975 he developed the first grading scale to define the degree of capsular contracture some patients experienced following breast augmentation. Published in 1978, The Baker Classification Scale became the international standard which is still used to this day. In 1984, he was elected President of the Florida Society of Plastic and Reconstructive Surgeons, and in 1995, he became President of The American Society for Aesthetic Plastic Surgery. He published 46 scientific papers, contributed to 13 textbooks, and produced 16 films on the field of plastic surgery.

He received numerous accolades throughout his career, including being named one of the "Top Cosmetic Surgeons in the U.S." by Town and Country magazine.

Q&A WITH MATT

- Q. Why is it important for you to stay involved with Florida Southern College as an alum?
- **A.** Florida Southern gave me a lot and I feel strongly that I should give back, which is why I stay connected to FSC as part of the National Alumni Board of Directors, as well as through the Sigma Chi Fraternity.
- Q. What was it about an endowed scholarship that made you decide that was how you wanted to give back to Florida Southern?

- Q. Why did you choose to have the endowed scholarship in Business Analytics?
